In the News - Our Take on What it Means to You

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Greetings!

Tragedies abound in the Sanford, Florida death of Trayvon Martin and the arrest of George Zimmerman. While we will *never* know what really happened, it is clear that Trayvon was a victim of more than just the actions of George Zimmerman.

Many of those outraged by Martin's death commented that Martin was targeted because he was black, and politicians joined in, as represented by Rep. Hank Johnson (D-Georgia) comments from the halls of Congress: "He was executed for 'WWB' in a 'GC.' Walking While Black in a Gated Community." MSNBC altered the 911 call such that it appeared that Martin was targeted because "he's black".

I don't know what happened, but I know that the certain politicians, certain media outlets, and a select few community activists are more interested in stoking the fires of racial discourse than they are in solving the real problem, gun violence in the African American community.

Black on black violence, while down somewhat year over year, represents

a far greater threat to future "Trayvon Martin's" than any future "George Zimmerman". The question is why are we as a society allowing the media to coverup the real isues confronting our communities? Philadelphia Police Commissioner Charles H. Ramsey was recently quoted in the New York times as saying "Nobody in this room, unless you're from Sanford, Fla., would even know the name of Trayvon Martin if it was a black kid that had shot Trayvon Martin," who is African-American.

For J. Whyatt Mondesire, the Philadelphia NAACP president, the problem of black homicide victims has posed a significant challenge. "I'm at my wit's end looking for solutions to this problem," said Mondesire, who has tried to reduce gun violence by speaking in Philadelphia schools.

Mondesire said that reaching black parents is an even more difficult, although necessary, task. "It starts in the home," he said. "There's a whole lot of parenting that's not going on."

Stopping the cycle of violence begins in the home, and requires everyone of all races to demand more of the parents.
